A MESSAGE FROM THE Superintendent

Spring 2023

This School Report highlights current activities and accomplishments while also addressing future goals the Board and I have for this District. Our top priority for 2022 was employee investment. With Board approval, our Individualized Investment in Employee Progression Plan



(IEP2) provided \$6.2 million toward raises, bonuses, and insurance premium increases - propelling JMCSS to the top 20% for starting salaries for districts statewide. We're also celebrating:

- Nine schools designated Reward Schools by the Tennessee Dept. of Education for significant academic growth
- 12 Level 5 schools the highest designation in the Tennessee Value-Added metric. Additionally, four schools were designated Level 4 schools
- 46 PreK classes in operation a historic high for JMCSS
- 31 JCM-Early College High students graduated with Associated Degrees
- 2 employees selected for state recognition for Teacher of the Year, Principal of the Year
- District ACT score increase of nearly a half point; 259 students improved their composite scores
- 98 students named to the All-Northwest Honor Choir
- Innovation Department received \$10 million for STEM, robotics expansion
- JCM-ECH/Madison Green Power Electric car team raced at Talladega Super Speedway
- State tournament appearances in cross country (Madison), boys and girls soccer (Madison), football (South Side), girls basketball (South Side), boys basketball (North Side and South Side) and track and field (Madison).

cafeteria manager - plays an integral role in our overall success. Each is appeciated. Each employee and each student matters!



Je'Delle, tell us about this Teaching as a Profession class: We started off by learning the history of education, and we slowly transitioned into student teaching part-time at Alexander elementary. Two days a week we'll come and spend about an hour in our designated classrooms and sit with the students. We listen to the lessons. Today we taught our first lesson! We had made our first lesson plan. Everything that we taught today in our lesson, we had written out ourselves.

What have you learned from the teacher? Ms. Sawyer is an amazing teacher. I've learned her patience with the students and the way that she's able to get through to all the students because they are different in their own way. regional hub for professional development, academics, athletics, and the arts is underway.

With our employees, students, and families in the forefront of these plans, JMCSS is in the opening phase of a bold investment in historic community assets, Jackson High and Oman Arena. Most recently the home of Madison Academic up until 2022, the historic Jackson High

building will undergo renovations and serve as the new Central Office. Centrally located with easy access for families via Jackson Transit buses, the historic property will allow JMCSS to increase services and support to families. A number of community partners will have satellite offices in the renovated building to support families in the area of health, finance, and recreation. A new multipurpose stadium will be the long awaited home for track and field events as well as football, and band events.

This addition will give all of our athletic programs options and access not yet provided by our community. Oman Arena is now offline to allow engineering and design firms to plan light demolition and hauling as significant updates are planned there as well. Every area of education - academics, athletics, and the arts - will benefit from these updates. A preliminary timeline for completion will be shared at Board meetings in early 2023. We have moved strategically and deliberately throughout this process and will continue to do so. These are exciting times for our students. families, and schools. Stay tuned.

ackson-Madison County Schools and Union University have announced an exciting new partnership between Union and the JMCSS K-12 CyberSchool Jackson Academic STEAM Academy (JASA). JASA is the first virtual school to partner with Union University in a dual enrollment program.

"Students at JASA can take classes at Union, be involved as students at Union, and expand their horizons and future aspirations," Union University President Dr. Dub Oliver said.

JASA senior Isaiah Hodges is among the students taking advantage of this new partnership in conjunction with the Tennessee Dual Enrollment Grant. In addition to upper-level English, Math and Science classes, JASA students have access to University services like academic advising, support services, supplemental college freshmen workshops and more. Families interested in joining JASA for the spring semester are encouraged to contact Dr. Currie at 731-506-2610 or via email jzcurrie@jmcss. org.

"Students will receive support not only from their high school, but also from a number of first year student aids offered by the University. It's a unique opportunity," Dr. Currie said.


A return to the state tournament is the goal for the Indians with Malik Currie, Tavaris Lambert, and DeAndre Minor. North Side finished 20-7 last season.


